FROM THE DESK OF FATHER CHRISTOPHER



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In music composition, a **movement** is a musical piece that can be performed on its own but is part of a larger composition. Movements can follow their own form, key, and mood, and often contain a complete resolution or ending. Complete musical works contain several movements, with three or four movements being the most common in a classical piece. Typically, each movement has its own name. Sometimes, the movement's name is indicated by the tempo of the movement, but other times, composers will give each movement a unique name that speaks to the larger story of the entire work.

Not knowing the entire work, I'm hesitant to give the most recent movement in my life a unique name, but if I had to name it according to its tempo, it would be **allegro ma non tanto (fast but not too much)**. This is a difficult movement that often requires a diligent group ready to move with each other deftly and leaves the audience with an uplifting sense of joy. This is a wonderful way to summarize my experience of my time

here as pastor of our three neighboring parishes. And it's ironic, because this name also characterizes the movement of history we're living in!

Like our fast but not too much time together, I'm confident that our deftone era of history will pass in a similar manner and leave us joyful whenever it reaches its end. Why do I believe this? Because our hope is in the Lord, and thanks to the Risen One we can be certain that our movement in the course of the world's history will end happily ever after if we embrace it with the heart of Christ. The end of the Angelus captures and expresses this passage of time in every era, therefore I leave you in prayer:

Pour forth, we beseech Thee, O LORD, Thy grace into our hearts; that, we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ, Thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection. Through the same Christ our Lord.


Sts. Peter & Paul Cemetery Entrance Project has been approved. We will be working with Timeless Columbaria from Pella, lowa for the niche bank cabinets as well as the limestone column and wall caps. ECI from Wadesville, Indiana will be handling our concrete and stone work. If you would like to learn more about Timeless Columbaria, you can visit their website at www.timelesscolumbaria.com.

Our niche bank cabinets will have a height of 44 inches and a width of 128 inches. One cabinet will set on each side of the cemetery main drive. The cabinets and stone work were designed specifically for our cemetery to blend with our parish campus. The niche bank cabinets have 12 inch by 12 inch niches which will inter only cremations unlike a mausoleum which has 32 inch by 26 inch crypts that inter caskets. A mausoleum is significantly taller than our columbaria and would not sit in the front of a cemetery.

We ask that you watch the bulletin for times when the cemetery will have limited access or will be closed. We will be removing our current entrance structure as well as having concrete work done to prepare for the arrival of the cabinets. The cabinets are projected to arrive in mid August/early September 2022.

On May 11, Fr. Christopher, Fr. Luke, Fr. Gary, Fr. Andrew and Joe Hopf held meetings to discuss several of many items that will need to be addressed as things move forward. Coming out of our meeting here are several areas that were discussed specifically and agreed upon by Fr. Gary, Fr. Andrew and Joe. Please understand that during our discussions we always took into account what we felt was best for parishioners, students, staff and the parish. What we don't want to have happen is disruption in areas that could negatively impact what has been and continues to be successful if we made changes at this time. In the following areas we will continue to operate as we currently do with Holy Cross St. James & Sts. Peter & Paul, using shared resources.

- Religious Education (Wednesday evening)
- ♦ SMG Youth Group (All activities) including St. Bernards
- School Music Teacher (Shared by Holy Cross, St. Joe, Sts. Peter & Paul)
- Director of Sacred Music (Music Ministries)
- ♦ School Sacraments (First Reconciliations, First Communion, Confirmation at this time would stay with one shared date for Holy Cross/Sts. Peter & Paul. St. James will have their own date.
- Vacation Bible School (As is for this year June 20 24)

A few other Items

- Finance & Accounting, Jane Rhodes and Joe Hopf will work with Angie Paul from St. Joe to develop the 2022/2023 budget. Develop a transition plan to move finance/accounting responsibility to Holy Cross.
- Sacraments of Marriage & baptism will be transitioned to Lisa O'Neal at Holy Cross beginning July 1, 2022
- ♦ Bulletin for the weekend of July 2,3, will change to St. Joe & Holy Cross sharing one bulletin.
- Potential Mass time changes for Holy Cross will come at a later date, but before the July 2,3 weekend.

There will be more information to come as things develop.

THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

It's all out of control. Inflation, the economy, violence, oppression, greed, morality, and tensions are all escalating as people scurry about for a sense of stability and well-being. Power seems to win the game and self-aggrandizement appears to be the order of the day. Love gets watered down to tolerance and accepting whomever and whatever is presented. The axis around which meaning and truth are found is twisted. Human beings appear to be engaged in an identity crisis of vast proportion, not certain whether standard, acceptable, and appropriate protocols exist any longer. We are lost. When one nation feels entitled to the goods of another and feels justified using any means possible to obtain them, we are in trouble. While this is happening most explicitly in Ukraine, there are other parts of the world where greed, exploitation, and violence are regular occurrences. Even in the United States, violent carjacking and general theft are becoming common place and a blatant disregard for human life seems more evident. We often act as if our journey of life is simply a random occurrence, that we are here on this planet for no known reason and accountable to no one. Norms and protocols, appearing to cater to personal preferences, become a matter of what protects each other's rights and space. Benchmarks and standards for growing, maturing, perfecting, and refining human thought and behavior no longer exist.

The world needs the Good News of the Ascension of Jesus Christ. Pope Francis tells us, "The Ascension does not point to Jesus' absence, but tells us that he is alive in our midst in a new way. He is now in the Lordship of God, present in every space and time, close to each one of us." If God is present in every space and time, then he is actively involved in what is happening in our lives. He works through both the positive and negative experiences we encounter, bringing us to a renewed and more focused place. The Ascension allows us to see this truth about ourselves and it enlightens our hearts. Christ, who was most perfectly, vividly, and brilliantly transfigured before the very eyes of the disciples will be our destiny.

Faith brings resolution to humanity's identity crisis. Faith corrects our misunderstandings of love. Faith seeks non-violent solutions to humanity's many conflicts. Faith removes our self-focus and deepens our vision. Faith provides the benchmarks we need to properly grow and mature. Faith provides the centering axis we need to order our lives. And only faith can give us real hope. Perhaps the cause of humanity's identity crisis is nothing other than an absence of faith. How can we believe that God takes a real interest in our lives if we do not believe in God in the first place? The answers to all that plagues us are not easily found. However, before we can even think of repairing and constructing, we need to have solid plans and build a secure foundation. The Ascension reminds us of who God is, who we are and who we are meant to be. All we must do is believe in what God promises. In this way, we acquire our anchor for proper self-knowledge and a benchmark for judging actions.

When people are so angry, hurting, displaced, confused, and broken it is hard to convince them that there is a better way. The rise in addiction and mental health issues are indicative of social structures that are failing. When the inability of society to care for a child who is unwanted justifies the right to take that child in its mother's womb something is incredibly wrong. It is only faith that can tell us, without doubt, who we are. Any decisions made without that secure and foundational reference point are subject to serious error. There is no doubt that our lives can become unsettled and empty. When we rely too much on the things of this world to please us, we can easily lose our excitement, enthusiasm, wonder, and joy. No worldly thing, no matter how great, can satisfy the longing of a human heart. Only God does that. Imagine how different life would be if everyone approached each moment as a creative opportunity to see what God will do. When encountered with faith, even darkness has great potential to become light. The neighbor who gets under our skin, the demanding coworker we see every day, the person at the supermarket who is rude to us, the elderly person we met on our daily walk who seemed so disheveled, the perfect sunrise that greeted us in the morning, and the wonderful aroma and taste of our first cup of coffee can all be used by God to awaken us, humble us, and bring us to a heightened sense of His presence. If people really understood the power of faith, they would have a better sense of who they are and where they are going. It would be harder to take some

thing from someone that doesn't belong to us, strike out in vengeful violence when we are hurt, allow greed to override the basic sanctity of human life, justify behaviors that are blatantly sinful and wrong, give in to the whims of desire and passion, and live life as if we are the only ones that matter. The world needs the Good News of the Ascension of Jesus Christ. Do not be reluctant to preach and accept the truth!

Christ is our destiny and our hope. It's that simple. Alleluia!

CHIEF OF PARISH OPERATIONS POSITION

The parishes of St. James & Sts. Peter & Paul announce a search to fill the Chief of Parish Operation position. We had this position posted previously and had some interest, but only had one really interested individual discuss with us in detail about the position itself. No one has officially applied. After the announcement of Fr. Andrew Thomas being named Administrator of St. James & Sts. Peter & Paul and Fr. Gary Kaiser being named Pastor of Holy Cross, I had a meeting with Fr. Andrew on May II and Fr. Andrew wants to move forward filling this position.

I would like to share a few thoughts with you about this position. I will have been in this position for five years at the end of this July, and without question this position is needed and easily justified even going down to two parishes and schools. Without this position the burden of managing the operation and administration of our **PARISHES AND SCHOOLS** would fall back to Fr. Andrew and an already small staff. This additional burden for Fr. Andrew would take away a significant amount of his time to spend on the ministries he is here to provide for all of us.

What this position has given back to me over these past five years more than outweighs what I have been able to give to our parishes. It has brought me closer to my catholic faith and closer to our God than I have ever been in my entire life. It gave me the opportunity to work with a great and knowledgeable staff, to work with great priests, Fr. Christopher, Fr. Luke, Fr. Betz, Fr. Tony, Fr. Ambrose and all of you, our parishioners.

I ask each and every one of you to think and prayerfully consider this position either for yourself or someone you think would be a great candidate. The right person may just need a little nudge to find out additional information about this vital position.

This isn't about you or me, this is about our Lord and Savior and providing what talents he has given each of us to be here to support our priest, staff, faculty and our parishioners. When Fr. Tony hired me in July 2017, he told me he felt that the Holy Spirit was at work that day when we first met in his office to talk about the Graces of God's Capital Campaign and ended with him discussing this position with me before I left his office. 
